## HEY, WHAT HAPPENED TO THE PLAYGROUND TREE?

We wanted to know the real scoop about the missing playground tree, and this is what we found. During the December ice storm one of our favorite trees suffered excessive damage with several large branches that broke. When a tree gets damaged it must be assessed to make sure it is safe. Several limbs were broken off and the trunk had started to become splintered so, the 4j school district decided to cut it down. Principal Tom told us the tree was 30 to 40 years old.

We didn't get as much damage as some schools; some schools lost power. Edison had power through the whole ice storm, but we didn't have any Wi-Fi. Tom had to come and run water to keep the pipes from freezing, and Jeremy, the custodian, had to keep the sidewalks safe. It took nearly a day to cut down the tree and a whole other to haul it out. Some of our black top was damaged because the filler was starting in previous repairs.

This was the largest snow and ice storm we've seen in years; it was so bad that we didn't have school for two days in December. Trees were falling, power lines were tumbling down; this was bad. We had more than one ice/snow storm over winter break. At the end of winter break we had two days worth of sledding. It got up to three inches of snow. We have had crazy weather this year! At night it went down to 15 degrees F. Some people didn't have power until January 2nd. That's 17 days without power! A witness told us that the school board had cut down the tree two days before school was supposed to start, and hauled it away the day before school was starting in January.



Then the snow fell and we didn't have school for two days because of the snow. So if they hadn't removed it then the fallen tree would be buried in snow, limiting our use of the playground!

We have six days of school to make up at the end of the year, that's cutting into our summer time! We may get even more days off, less summer, MORE school. We'll see!

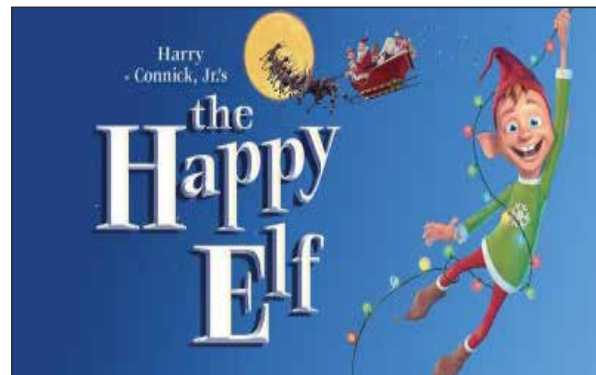

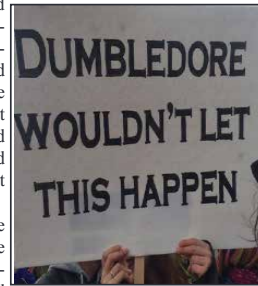

That snow was beautiful, the kids certainly enjoyed themselves, and it wasn't as bad of a storm as what hit Portland. But, because we missed six instructional days 4j have some decisions to make. Here is the latest...

### District considering options to recover lost instruction time

Oregon has been facing unusually severe winter weather. Like most other Oregon districts, Eugene School District 4J already has had an unprecedented number of no-school days due to hazardous weather—and winter isn't over yet.

This year's calendar plans for weather days to be made up at the end of the school year, and the district does expect to restore at least three school days in June. However, given the unusually high number of days, the district is looking at possible alternatives for recovering lost instructional time.

All options for meeting state instructional time requirements are being considered, including possibilities such as adjusting daily schedules or

making up school days before the end of the year.

When these decisions are made and an adjusted calendar is approved by the school board, the plan will be widely communicated through the district website, social media, news media, email, and more.

Q: If a student is struggling in your class what do you do to help them?

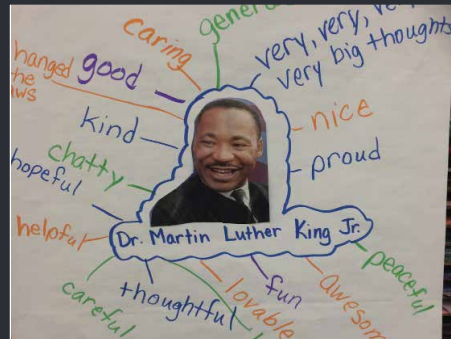
