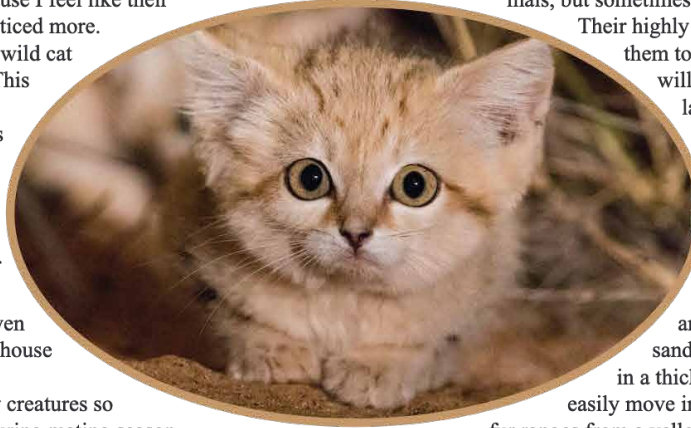
Sand Cats

You might be wondering, “What the heck are sand cats?” Well, I can’t blame you; hardly anyone’s ever heard of them! But I think they should be popular. They are cuter than unicorns, and unicorns are popular. I am writing an article on sand cats because I feel like their greatness needs to be noticed more.

A sand cat is a small wild cat that lives in the desert. This mammal is a carnivore, which means it only eats meat, like most other cats. Sand cats are the smallest wild cat in the world—weighing 4-8 pounds, with a height of 10-12 inches and 29-36 inches long! They are even smaller than an average house cat!

Sand cats are solitary creatures so they live alone except during mating season. These wild cats are very territorial and they use pee and claw marks to mark their territory. To make their home, they dig burrows in the sand or live in abandoned fox or porcupine burrows. Sometimes they will even take over old rodent burrows. Sand cats are nocturnal in the Summer, and during



the Winter months they remain in the sun. They bury their remains of the leftovers of prey caught earlier, and then eat it later so they don’t have to hunt every time they’re hungry.

Typically sand cats hunt rodents and other small mammals, but sometimes they will eat small birds.

Their highly developed hearing allows them to easily hunt prey. Then they will bury it in the ground for later. These animals are small, but also great hunters.

A sand cat’s giant ears are very sensitive and they have a pale sandy brown coat. It’s slightly darker on the back and it is pale on the belly area. It’s ears are large and triangular. A sand cat’s paw pads are covered in a thick layer of fur, so they can easily move in a desert environment. The fur ranges from a yellowish-brown to a dull grey and it has dark stripes on its cheeks.

So, you might be wondering if sand cats are endangered, which luckily, sand cats aren’t endangered or threatened, but they are near threatened. They are dying due to habitat loss, like droughts, which kills life in the desert.

HOW TO MAKE A BUBBLE LAMP!

Welcome! We have made a very cool science project for you guys this time! Drum roll please.....A BUBBLE LAMP!!!!

Ingredients

- One 1-liter clear soda bottle
- ¾ cup water
- Vegetable oil
- Fizzing tablets (such as alka seltzer)
- Food coloring

Instructions

- 1) Put water in bottle.
- 2) Put vegetable oil in to the bottle (best if your funnel or measuring cup) until almost full.
- 3) Wait a few minutes (preferably 5-minutes)
- 4) Add 10 drops of food coloring (not yellow)
- 5) Break tablet in half and drop into the bottle
- 6) Watch it sink to the bottom of the bottle (For better effect shine flashlight through bottom if wanted)
- 7) Add the other half of tablet

How Does it Work...

The reason it looks like a bubble lamp is because the oil is lighter than the water so, it stays on top (less dense). If you shake the lamp, the liquid inside will change color. If you add food coloring to the lamp the water will change color, but food coloring cannot mix with the oil, which means it will mix with the water instead. Then the alka seltzer you put in makes the water fizz. After the water fizzes, it makes its way through the oil and then it settles bottom. That is how you make a bubble lamp! In the November election voters passed Measure 20-297, the school bond measure which provides funds for school improvements at every 4j school and for every 4j student. With the funds received from this bond measure 4j plans to rebuild three schools:

Edison elementary, Camas Ridge elementary, and North Eugene High School. Obviously work done on a new Edison school (however that may look) is a big, important job for the Edison students and greater community.

Details of how, when, and what a new Edison will look like, etc. have not been decided and will most likely take some time to be organized. Decisions related to where students will go during a rebuild and the order of schools to be built are significant pieces of this puzzle. That too, has not been decided or at least not been shared with the public.

The bottom line is that with voters passing the bond, we know there will be significant change to Edison's building. There most likely will be a time for community input and sharing of information during different phases of the process. We suggest that parents stay involved and continue to advocate what will be best for all students. Because the Edison building is on a small footprint compared to other elementary schools, and there continues to be advocacy from parent/community organizations, there most likely will be an interesting non-traditional process in deciding what a school will look like. We hope and expect 4j will be open and forthcoming with information as it becomes available. Stay tuned, and we will do our best to keep you updated.

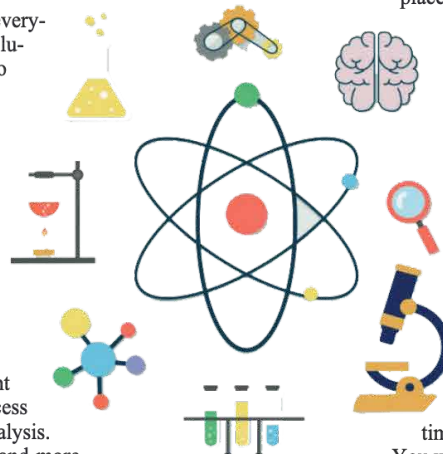
What is the Scientific Method?

With the many branches of science providing more and more information about the conditions of the universe, the scientific community continues to show us valuable data. This data helps us to better understand the world we live in and guides us to greater and greater scientific information.

Scientific research helps us understand everything from medical treatments to car pollution, or potential life on other planets to animal populations on Earth. Lately, climate change and the impact it has on Earth have been a major topic of interest students are learning more about. How do scientists know their information is accurate with something as important as climate change? How do we know science is pointing us in the right direction?

Luckily, scientists use the Scientific Method when conducting experiments. The Scientific Method is the all-important process of gathering information. This process involves observation, experiments, and analysis. The Scientific Method has become more and more developed over thousands of years of human thinking, with the modern inductive-deductive method coming from a man named Aristotle, over 2000 years ago.

For the purpose of our article, the Scientific Method we use at Treetop Academics has seven steps that are easy to memorize and make sense once you learn how it works, just like a Scientist! Use these steps when conducting your own fun experiment at home.



Step #1: Decide on a Research Question: If you are following this at home and want to test the scientific method, make sure your question can be tested and measured. What do you find interesting that you can observe?

Step #2: Conduct Research: Learn more about the topic from your research question. This may include taking to experts, reading books, finding information on the internet, or visiting places.

Step #3: Develop your Hypotheses: A hypotheses is an educated guess. You are trying to guess a possible answer to your question based on the information you know. It is Ok if your answer is wrong, and sometimes that is from where the greatest discoveries come!

Step #4: Make a Plan: This is the step where you design an experiment to help you answer your question. Write out a step-by-step plan that includes the parts of your experiment, including variables and constants. Variables are things that change, and Constants are things that stay the same.

Step #5 Conduct your Experiment: Now is the time to conduct your experiment or experiments. You will want to conduct your experiment several times to see if you get the same results or different results.

Step #6 Collect and Record Data: Record all the data (facts and statistics) from your experiment. You may want to create a chart or graph to show the data you have collected from your experiment.

Step #7 Draw Conclusions: Analyze your data and the results of your experiment. Compare the results with your hypothesis. Was your hypothesis correct? Maybe not, but what other information did you discover with your experiment? Maybe you realize you need another experiment to test a new hypothesis!

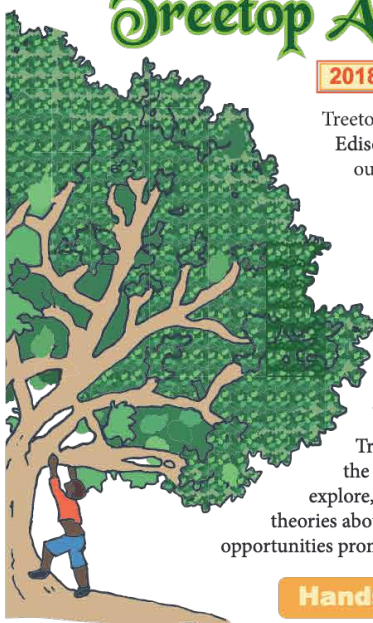
