
To show *Inclusion* you need to invite people into your group and be kind and welcoming to them.



50 years ago, December 1972, was the last time a human stepped foot on the Moon. NASA's Apollo 17 was the last crewed mission to the moon; no person has been back since. Jump forward to November 2022 when NASA (the U.S. Space Program) began the Artemis Program with the launch of Artemis I. The Artemis I mission didn't send a person to the moon, but it was the first mission in the program that will eventually send astronauts back to the moon. Let's look at the Artemis Program and explore how the Artemis I launch was an important step to the future of human space travel.

The Artemis program is the next step in Moon missions after the Apollo programs first sent humans to the Moon in 1969 and ended in 1972. In Greek mythology Artemis was the twin sister of Apollo and goddess of the Moon. You can see why NASA named the missions after the Artemis myths, with Apollo being the first missions to the Moon 50 years ago, and Artemis (as the twin) continuing in the footsteps of Apollo.


The Artemis I mission is the first mission in a series of eight or more proposed missions. The first three are focused on getting humans back to the Moon. Further missions are about establishing a long-term presence on the Moon and using what can be learned to take the next step in planetary exploration by sending humans to Mars.

The Artemis Program has several parts necessary for all the missions to work. With Artemis I,II,III, and beyond, NASA will need more, and more, hardware to accomplish the mission and explore further. Each mission will need the SLS (Space Launch System Rocket) and the Orion Spacecraft. The SLS is the rocket that will send astronauts, the Orion, and cargo to the Moon. The Orion Spacecraft is the NASA spacecraft that will carry astronauts from Earth to lunar orbit and back.



further than the Apollo 13 record for distance traveled from Earth in a spacecraft designed for humans. A few weeks after launch, Artemis I splashed down in the Pacific Ocean, as planned. Previous Space Shuttle Missions (1981-2011) all landed like conventional aircraft, on a runway, although needing to reenter the Earth's atmosphere at a very high speed. Capsules splashing down in oceans with parachutes hasn't been used since Apollo missions 50 years ago.

Now that Artemis I was a success, Artemis II is scheduled to send four crew to the lunar environment in a flyby of the Moon in 2024. Astronauts in the Orion will get a close-up view with Earth as a backdrop, something not done in over 50 years. This is like the mission of Apollo 8, as a test run for the Apollo 11 Moon landing. Artemis III will have a crew of four with two astronauts landing on the surface of the Moon.




This will be the first-time humans set foot on the Moon in over 50 years and historically, be the first time a woman and person of color, or non-white person, will be placed on the Moon. Those two astronauts are expected to spend almost a week on the surface of the Moon (with the use of a Lunar Rover to be delivered earlier,) while the remaining crew are held at the Lunar Gateway, a small modular space station established in lunar halo orbit. The lunar astronauts will use the Space X, Starship HLS lander to descend to the Moon and return to the Gateway where the SLS and Orion

flight to make sure everything works properly so astronauts can be successful in future missions. With Artemis I, NASA needs to successfully test the high-speed Earth reentry (at Mach 32, or 24,500 miles per hour,) and the heat shield's performance as it enters Earth's atmosphere. The heat shield will heat to nearly 5,000 degrees Fahrenheit, which is about half as hot as the surface of the sun. The heat shield is necessary so astronauts and a capsule reentering the Earth's atmosphere at such high speeds won't burn up upon reentry.

In November 2022, Artemis I launched on a 25-day mission and successfully traveled 1.3 million total miles. SLS and Orion traveled about 280,000 miles from Earth, and 40,000 miles beyond the Moon, before it returned home. This is will be docked, ready to take them back to Earth. And the great this is, it is all coming to a galaxy near you in the next few years!

FOXES

I am writing about foxes because I did a presentation about them last year in Portland, OR. In these paragraphs, I will teach you about foxes, things like what they eat, how they hunt, their predators, and more! I hope you know more by the time you have finished reading! Enjoy!

What do foxes eat?

Foxes eat small animals, including squirrels, rats and birds. They can also eat bugs, if it is a small fox like the Fennec fox, and in the Red foxes case, even small deer! Other things that foxes can eat are rabbits, rodents, frogs, earthworms and carrion! There are some surprising things foxes will eat, which are human waste, fruit, berries, and when there isn't anything else to eat, veggies! Foxes are not picky eaters!

How do foxes hunt?

Foxes hunt with their senses. They use their sharp sense of smell and their keen ears to track down prey. If their food is in snow or underground, they will dig down to find it. If the fox can see the prey, it'll get down low and sneak quietly toward the small animal. Once the fox is close enough, it pounces! That's how a fox hunts!

What are a fox's predators?

Some animals that eat foxes are bears, mountain lions, big birds like eagles, certain reptiles, wolves, and lynxes. Large snakes also eat foxes, but boas and pythons are the only identified snake that eats foxes conveniently.

How do foxes stay safe from predators?

Foxes can stay safe from predators in many different ways. They can dig holes in the ground to hide in, and Red Foxes will build dens. They wait until the predator is tired of waiting and runs away, and then they escape. Foxes can also climb trees, camouflage, and if needed, they will fight with their sharp claws and teeth. Now, this is how a fox stays safe from predators!

The Secrets Behind Egyptian Hieroglyphs

I was on vacation in Portland and we went out for a walk to get breakfast at a cafe. We decided to go to the Portland Art Museum nearby because it would be fun. Then we saw they had this exhibit about ancient Egypt and Queen Nefertari. Part of the exhibit was about Hieroglyphics. I wanted to be able to read the messages they wrote! On the way out we stopped at the gift shop and I asked my mom if they had anything about the hieroglyphs. I found a book that teaches me how to read hieroglyphics called "How to Read Ancient Egyptian Hieroglyphs" by Marcus Fowler and Jean Rogers. My mom was so kind that she bought it for me. Now I will share some of what I learned from visiting the museum, reading this book, and researching some other sources so that you can learn about hieroglyphs too.

Ancient Egyptians lived thousands of years ago. And they had a special way to read and write. It's called hieroglyphs. Hieroglyph is kind of like the alphabet. Certain pictures meant certain sounds. For example, this symbol means man. And this symbol 2 means eat and drink. Did you notice that the symbols represent what they mean? Like the eat or drink one. His hand is up to his mouth like what we do when we eat or drink.

Most ancient Egyptians were not literate. Not literate, or illiterate, means you're not good at reading or writing. If you can't understand hieroglyphics, it's okay because only 1% of ancient Egyptians could.


Most Egyptians didn't need to learn how to read or write because they were farmers. But the 1% of Egyptians who did learn and know how to read and write Hieroglyphs were usually priests and royalty. For example, Queen Nefertari, who lived around 3,300 years ago and was married to Pharaoh Ramesses the second, was very good at reading and writing hieroglyphs and she used her skills to write letters to other world leaders at the time she was queen. She also showed herself as a scribe in paintings on her tomb. Queen Nefertari's tomb is unusually large and one of the most important in the Valley of the Queens in upper Egypt. The tomb is covered in pictures, codes, and messages, usually known as hieroglyphs.

Unfortunately, large and special tombs like Nefertari's are popular with tomb robbers. Many artifacts from Nefertari's tomb were stolen. But the paintings on the walls remain and tell us many things about her and her life. The Rosetta Stone is a large stone tablet that translates between Egyptian and Greek. It was probably created sometime between 300 and 0 BC when Egypt and Greece had a lot of connections. Since people still understood Greek when it was found in 1799, it means researchers could start to use the Greek to decode the hieroglyphs and understand their meaning again. Here is a picture of the Rosetta Stone:


Today the Rosetta Stone is housed in the British Museum in London, England and you can visit and see it yourself.

Now anyone can learn how to understand hieroglyphics and you can even spell your name if you want to. If the Rosetta Stone didn't exist, we might have never been able to understand hieroglyphics. But thankfully the discovery of this important artifact means that we can understand so much more about ancient Egypt and its people.

Here is a list of the phonograms in hieroglyphics. Can you spell your name?



There are three different types of hieroglyphs. Logograms, phonograms, and determinatives. Logograms represent a whole word or idea, like the man and the eating/drinking above. Phonograms represent a sound, like in someone's name. For instance, sounds like 'n' in Nefertari. Finally, determinatives are a type of hieroglyph that get put at the end of a word or phrase to clarify the meaning. For instance, at the end of sounding out a name like Nefertari, you might add a symbol like an image of a woman to clarify who these sounds are describing . (I saw this at the museum on a piece of furniture with Nefertari's name on it). There are over 1,000 hieroglyph symbols in total.

At some point in history, people stopped using Egyptian hieroglyphs. For a long time, no one could understand them. But then, in 1799, the leader of France (his name was Napoleon) invaded Egypt with his army. During the invasion, the army discovered something very important called the Rosetta Stone.




