Welcome Back Edison students to the new school year and to your new building! After two years at the Willard site, we are finally back at the original Edison site where our previous building stood for 94 years! Although we all miss the old building, I think many agree the new building rocks!

October 25th 2022 was the open-house event with ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new Edison School.

Hundreds of neighbors, parents, students, past principals and teachers all participated in the ceremony, social gathering, and tour.

The event was well attended and all participants had a chance to view the school. The new Edison was funded by the 2018 school bond and is the first of three new schools to be built in 4j.

Throughout the school year there will be minor improvements as we get settled into the new academic space. There have already been a few improvements since the building was opened on the first day of school. The new security front door was installed with a second door coming sometime in November. When the installation is finished there will be two doors to entry when you arrive through the front doors.

Other small finishing touches were also recently done along with adjustments to existing systems now staff has had time to adjust to the demands and features of a new modern building.

Fortunately, the grass playground area quickly grew and students used the full playground space in October. A

pole and additional hoop have yet to be installed on the playground, but should be coming soon.



The little free library has been installed on the West side of the building inside the cupola. Feel free to add or take books from this library. It is being maintained by the South University Neighborhood Association (SUNA) in collaboration with Edison.

Edison's Historic Items

Edison School was built in 1926 and opened as a school for the 1927 school year. Originally Edison had a much smaller footprint, with multiple additions to the building over its 94 year lifespan. In 2020 the "old" building was demolished and the current Edison was built in its place. Through photos and historical documentation, much of

the surrounding streets and houses were designed around Edison as a neighborhood school. Today the new building stands in place of the old school with some elements and artifacts from the original building.

As you can see from the picture of the 1926 building, the arch entrance was an iconic part of the school design. Architects, with input from the surrounding community wanted to retain the classic Edison arch in the new building design. Although, not the same, the arch entrance with the *Edison School* sign is similar to the original. The "buttons" on both sides of the sign are original to the archway of the old building. The original *Edison School* sign that was once on top of the 1926 arch was carefully taken down and mounted on the Onyx St. side of the new building.

There are three lights in the entrance to the new Edison that are original to the old building. The bases for the two globe lights on either side of the entrance are original, but the globes themselves were replaced. There use to be three globe lights on the original building, but one was removed a long time ago. The hanging pedestal light in the front foyer is also original. That light was one of two that once hung inside the 4th/5th grade foyer leading to the lower level of the building.

On the West side of the building is a cupola and the cornerstone to the original building. The cornerstone was mounted on the 1926 building and carefully removed during the demolition of the original building. Its new resting place is now in the ground next to the old cupola that once stood on top of the original building.

There are two cupolas that were original to the building, even though they looked like bell towers you might expect in a 19th Century one-room school house, they were in fact used as air intake for the building. The Historic Whiteaker School on North Grand St. in Eugene has a very similar design to the original Edison (They were built about the

same time with the similar design) where you can still see the cupola on the roof and same cornerstone design.

The cupola was, in part, what made Edison have the older historic look loved my so many in the neighborhood. The one cupola that stands on the West side of the building has been restored with an extra addition. The *Little Free Library*

has been added at the base of the cupola. The bricks surround the cupola area are from the original building, along with the cornerstone. The second cupola is being held at a secure facility by Hyland Construction (who built the new Edison) in case something happens to the existing cupola and it is in need of repair. There were also a few hundred bricks from the original building that went with the stored cupola.

Inside, the stairwell leading up to the

upper level, just inside the entrance, has a mural of the original blueprints for the 1926 cupola design. As you pass by the mural you can see writing and specifications that architects and builders used almost 100 years ago! To preserve some of the historical integrity of the building the mural was added to the actual original cupola as a part of

With community input, the new design of the Edison building was important not only for the necessary safety features with a new modern building, but from a historical preservation lens. It was near impossible to preserve the old Edison in its entirety, but it was important for the Edison community and surrounding neighborhood to incorporate some elements from the original building. Thank you to all those that helped preserve some of the old Edison artifacts and to those who worked to advocate for retaining the historical integrity of the school and neighborhood.


